We carried on through August but were then closed again due to Covid-19 until the ides of March, 2021, when we reopened for coffee and yoga with the same precautionary measures.

Bingo resumed in mid-June and was well attended by many happy area seniors anxious to reconnect with one another.

We were unable to schedule any entertainment programs due to the uncertainty of future Covid shutdowns but happily brought in some new programming and events for the upcoming fiscal year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Clarksburg D.P.W. has continued to maintain town roads and property to the best of its ability with the funds received from the town and the state during the fiscal year.

During the winter the department worked 162 hours outside our regular shift on snow roads. We purchased 720 tons of treated road salt and 207 tons of coarse winter sand.

The department installed 60' of 18" plastic culvert, 55' of 12" plastic culvert on middle road. We used 90 ton of hot mix for patching purposes, line painting was also completed this year.

The department saw the completion of our shop addition, and is very pleased with the outcome. We accepted delivery of a new international dump truck with plow and wing, and rebuilt the old sander to fit this truck.

Several things small projects were completed such as drop box installed at town hall, basketball hoops reinstalled, horseshoe pits were built and installed at the senior center, new flag pole and bollard installed at cemetery and a gate built and installed for our gravel pit.

The department continues to move forward with state I & I requirements for the sewer system, we are in our second phase of this requirement and will continue to move forward with this lengthy process.

We continue to have all town roads swept in the spring, work on brush, road side mowing, clean and repair drainage catch basins and sewer manholes, drainage ditching, street signs. Maintain all town property, buildings, and equipment.

Police Department

The Clarksburg Police Department is proud to be able to serve the community through the 2021 fiscal year.

The department had Aaron Goodell resign as patrol officer. The department appointed Peter Kirchman and Winthrop Todd to the department.

Covid 19 caused challenges for the department. The department still operated through the beginning of the fiscal year with operations modified regarding limiting contact with people which decreased motor vehicle stops.

Because of the decrease in children riding the school bus and an increase with parents dropping off their kids created an increase of traffic at the school for pick up and drop off. The department provided traffic officers during the morning drop off and evening pick up. Working with the school there were modifications with the line up of vehicles and the process in the way they would escort the children to and from pick up and drop off.

The department received a increase in reports about ATV and off road motor bikes operating on public roadways. There was also property damage done at the senior center. Through patrols and communication with people known to own ATV and motor bikes we were able to identify some of the individuals involved and some stops were made and enforced.

The ROPES program was cancelled due to covid.

The department worked with the board of health to provide a safe environment for the community and town employees. Access was limited to the town hall and police department. Working with the Department of Public Works and Board of Health we established a safe and organized way for residents to safely vote. We were able to establish in person annual town meeting and a special town meeting by holding the meetings outdoors.

The Clarksburg Police Department is going through a change in operations due to police reform. The intermittent police academy held their last class in the spring of 2021 and were able to appoint two officers from the last two academies. All officers will have to attend a bridge academy according to new standards to bring their certification to a full-time academy training certification. Additional in-service, firearms and/or defense tactics, annual training has been added. The department implemented a new use of force policy according to the reform

I would like to thank the board of selectman, and the residents of the Town of Clarksburg for their support and assistance.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT AND PRINCIPAL AND EXPENDITURE REPORT.

The North Berkshire School Union Administrative Team, in conjunction with the building principal and School Committee, work to enhance and improve the Clarksburg School for students and staff. The mission of the Clarksburg School continues to be to engage and support all learners through the development and implementation of a rigorous K-8 comprehensive curriculum to meet the diverse needs of all students in content areas aligned with state standards. As always, we work hard to ensure that our students are fully prepared to be successful in the next stage of their academic lives.

Highlights of the 2020/21 school year are as follows:

Our school year began unlike any other. In the midst of a continuing global Covid-19 pandemic, we planned extensively over the summer following state and CDC guidance to prepare a safe environment to mitigate any spread to students or staff. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) shortened the school year to 170 days, and we opened school mid-September after using the first 10 days of the regular school year to plan for these very different circumstances around physical safety including mask wearing, distancing, and hygiene.

With new distancing requirements, we did not have enough physical space in our classrooms and had to split large classes, such as Kindergarten and 2nd grade into two rooms. Our K-2 students began full day, in-person learning during the first week of school and grades 3-5 followed the second week, beginning their first week remote. Our middle school grades were remote for the first 2 weeks, and then we gradually brought each grade level back for half day, in-person learning. Most schools in the county and across the country were fully remote in the fall of 2020. We are proud to say that our K-5 students were fully in person from the start.

In regards to our facility, we continued to finish our ADA bathroom and upgrades to the nurse's office in the fall, while much of our attention shifted to our ventilation systems. We bought stand alone HEPA units for the primary wing classrooms and ensured the ventilation systems in the 3-8 classrooms were working properly.

Students in grades 3-8 participated in a modified MCAS State Testing program. The state decreased the amount of time on testing to accommodate the unusual constraints of the school year.

Students in grades K-8 participated in virtual Student-led Conferences in the fall and outdoor conferences in the spring. Student-led conferences are different than traditional parent-teacher conferences because they put students at the center of the conference, giving them an opportunity to explain work artifacts in their portfolios and reflect on their learning and growth.

Our traditional trips off campus and out of town continued to be canceled or limited due to the pandemic.

The school worked closely with emergency responders and local law enforcement to develop and practice several safety drills to ensure the safety of our students.

In the spring, Superintendent Franzoni spearheaded the creation of a Pre Kindergarten program at Clarksburg School for the 2021-22 school year. Clarksburg has been one of the only towns in Berkshire County that does not offer a learning environment for 3 and 4 year olds. Through budget planning and preparation in the spring, Clarksburg will welcome our youngest residents into the building at the start of the new school year.

In order to create more space in the school for a Pre-K program, the school entered into an agreement with the Town Library to share the space that adjoins the school and library. Through close collaboration, terms and conditions were agreed upon, and the school invested approximately \$30,000 of grant funds to build a sliding "barn door" and rearrange the bathroom area in the library to accommodate a truly shared space. Construction of this space happened over the summer of 2021 to be ready for the fall and the opening of the new school year.

Finally, we would like to thank the teachers, parents, town officials, community and school committee members, Laura Wood, Cindy Brule, and Eric Dennette for their continued participation, hard work, and support afforded to the Clarksburg School through the 2019-20 school year. The community's dedication to the school system It is greatly appreciated.
